This is thanks to our Ukes in Schools initiative, which to date has delivered over 4,000 ukuleles to schools/kura across the motu - for free! We are delighted to have the Wright Family Foundation also supporting this kaupapa. Last year they funded 24 class set of ukuleles to schools across the Bay of Plenty and by the time this magazine reaches you, there will be over 65 small rural and isolated schools/kura across the motu enjoying their brand new sets of ukuleles - including, not least of all, Pitt Island school! - Mahitahi Step up as student leaders in their own or a local primary school/kura, and be part of Bill Sevesi's dream.
